

A few weeks ago I finally heard a vital truth announced on national headlines: "It's inexcusable that those people that pick our fruits and vegetables ... don't get the right working conditions." Unfortunately, the occasion for Gov. Schwarzenegger's statement was yet another needless farm worker death due to heat exhaustion -- this time a 17 year old young woman pruning grapes in California.

As Teresa Niedda, Director of the Farm Worker Health and Safety Institute wrote recently, "Farm workers are treated like second-class citizens living in third world conditions within one of the riches countries in the world. They have fewer rights and legal protections than workers in any other industry."

Health, environmental and animal rights activists urge us to know more about how and where our food is grown. At National Farm Worker Ministry we urge you to know more about *the people* who plant, tend and harvest our fruits and vegetables, who care for the cows providing our meat, milk and cheese, and who tend the nursery plants we use in our own gardens.

It is our privilege at NFWM to come to know farm workers, our pain to know of their substandard wages and commonplace abuse, and our pride to stand with them as they





organize to win justice and equality for themselves, their families and their communities.

We respond to our experience by educating others about the well-hidden reality of farm workers' lives and then involving people in action — leafleting at grocery stores, writing letters to government or corporations, holding vigils at shareholder meetings, marching - whatever it takes to bring public attention so that decision-makers act more fairly toward farm workers.

And there are victories to share along the way when migrant housing standards are improved or labor agreements are won which improve wages and working conditions and provide workers for the first time with a voice to speak up about abuse.

In this prayer pamphlet we share with you the privilege of knowing the people who labor to produce our food. We hope you will hear their words deeply, reflect on all they give us, and commit yourself to joining them as they seek justice.
